## Did You Know?

### About the Brush Factory



In the early 1940's, the "Brush Factory", as it was known locally, was established by Jules Samaan.

Along with his financial partner John N. (Jack) Brown of Youngs Point, Samaan processed balsam brush into oil. The Dominion Essential Oil Company was located on the west bank of Eel's Creek at McFadden Road and Highway 28. Operating in a crude building, local people, including Bill McFadden, cut balsam and cedar brush that was processed into oil in the hand-made still that was used to "cook" the brush.

Jules Samaan, a chemist from Germany, experimented with the manufacturing of hand lotion, perfume and cleaning solvent from the resultant oil. The products were marketed to North American and European distributors.
