

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY REMINDER FOR MOTORISTS


The Peterborough County Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police would like to remind all motorists to think of the safety of our area students and the importance of driving cautiously around school buses and school crossing areas.

A Reminder to STOP for School Buses

Recently, Peterborough OPP received complaints from bus drivers that motorists are not stopping when children are getting on and off the bus when they had their red lights flashing and stop sign extended. No students have been injured but dangerous situations were created.

Motorists travelling in both directions must stop for a stopped school bus that has its overhead red lights flashing and stop sign on the side of the bus extended. This includes vehicles travelling on all lanes of multi-lane highways such as Highway 7. Drivers who fail to stop for school busses will be charged under the Highway Traffic Act. Driver's face a fine of \$490 and 6 demerit points will be added to their licence if found guilty. In addition, your insurance rates will probably increase by 10% or more for three years.

Please see the graphic below. The only place you don't have to stop for a school bus is on a highway which is divided by an unpaved section or a physical barrier which prevents vehicles from crossing over. To be clear, a paved island at an intersection is not considered to be such a physical barrier.

Vehicles behind bus MUST stop. Vehicles travelling in the opposite direction are not required to stop but should exercise caution.

The key is: The highway must be divided by an unpaved section or a physical barrier which prevents any vehicle from crossing the roadway.
